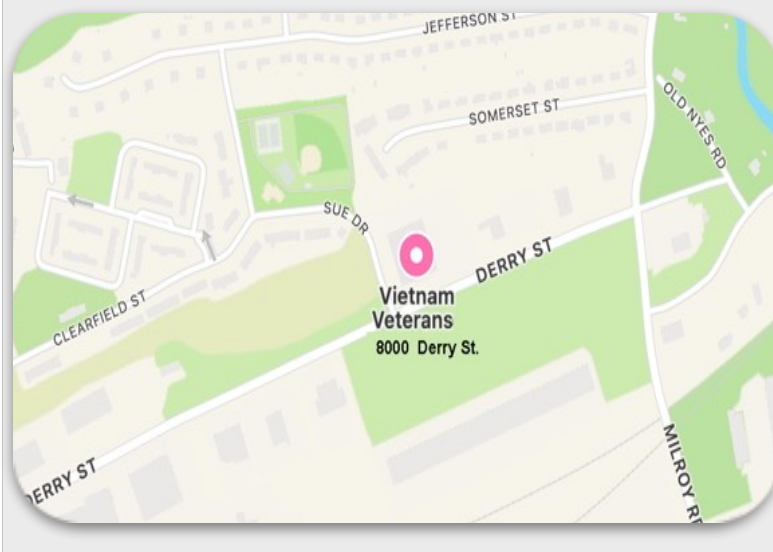

The Harrisburg Radio Amateurs Club Inc., [HRAC] formed 1 July 1946, as an association of individuals commonly interested in amateur radio, based in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. It is an ARRL affiliate club.

At the end of World War II, many veterans returned to the Harrisburg area trained and used radio communications in the military. It soon became a common factor among local hobby enthusiasts. Fifty-eight charter members developed the original constitution and bylaws for the club. In 1960, HRAC became a non-profit corporation in Pennsylvania.

The club continues to promote amateur radio in the area in many ways. HRAC is involved with young people by helping with scouting's JOTA activities and promoting amateur radio with school clubs and organizations.

Since 1949, members have provided communications for the American Red Cross in Harrisburg for Dauphin County and Pennsylvania Emergency Management. In addition, we conduct periodic training sessions for emergency responders.

HRAC has three hamfests throughout the year: July's **Firecracker Hamfest** /Eastern Pa Section Convention is always the Saturday before the first Sunday in July. During the convention, you may hear special event station W3UU from the hamfest tailgating area. We set up and operate W3UU to demonstrate amateur radio and invite operators to join in and make contacts. Second: **Oktoberfest**. Third: the well attended **WinterFest** in January is an indoor tailgate fest.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT:

This month's spotlight is **Curt Sanders, K3URT.**

Robert Louis Stevenson said "turn about's fair play" so I guess it is my turn:

What drew you to be interested in amateur radio? (Who introduced you? Did you have an Elmer? Or was it something else? etc.)

Principally, Marshall, W3KRM (SK), a WWII buddy of my father. He and Dad would visit Dick Pheil's local TV store (W3HSU, SK) and bring me along. I thought it was a miracle that voices and images could travel invisibly over the air! Dad taught me Morse Code (long forgotten), and antenna making — but his career and other duties eventually took him away from the hobby. (He was more interested in flying, a pilot since 1938, and was heavily involved in the space-race industry in the 1960 and 70s.) It was all super amazing to me.

Why did you pick your vanity call?

Initially licensed as N3TLJ, when the FCC came out with vanity licensing, I searched the database, found K3URT, and obtained it in 1994. I thought it would be easy for others to remember, similar to my first name. I am the second holder of this call.

What is the most fun part of amateur radio? (Kit building, talking, etc.)

I like DXing, and I was an avid SWLer in the 1960-80s before getting my ticket in 1993. I eventually started contesting to log the DXCCs.

HAM HISTORY • HARRISBURG
Olmsted AFB redux

Last month's article stirred up some memories for Glenn, K3SWZ, regarding Olmsted AFB in Middletown:

"When I was first licensed in 1962, Air Force MARS was alive and well at Olmsted AFB on the North Area where [Penn State University] is now. They had a MARS [Military Affiliate Radio Station] station that was manned by USAF troops as their job. There was an enlisted guy, an NCO and an officer. I don't know what their operating schedule was? They would get 'Health and Welfare' traffic (messages) from MARS nets on HF (SSB and RTTY) and it would be distributed around the area by hams who were in the MARS program. There was a 6 Meter AM Net each week and actual traffic was sent. It was on 49.980 MHz.

That Net was a big deal... It probably had 75 check-ins! The call sign of that MARS station was K3AIR¹ for ham use and AG1DN on the MARS frequencies. They used to have quarterly meetings in the NCO Club at Olmsted... For a high school kid that was cool. There was a big national drill and all MARS stations had to be on the air for 24 hours straight. This was in 1964. I remember because I could drive. They were looking for operators to assist in the manning overnight, as the USAF troops would man it thru the day. I volunteered as it was a great reason to hook school and they would feed us. Somehow, I talked my parents into allowing me actually do it! Perry Bates, K3QQA and I manned the station.

The 'pay' for all of this effort in the MARS program was supposedly, you would be eligible to receive surplus gear based on points you would earn for participation. That had a lot of flaws and only the good old boys got anything worthwhile! They had basements full of gear that they had no plans to ever use! Slowly MARS died and by the time Olmsted closed it was gone. Air Force MARS membership did look good on my enlistment paperwork for the PA Air National Guard. Around 1969 while I was in the ANG, I realized that K3AIR was expired, and I ask the Commander of the 271st [Mobile] Communications Sqdn. at HIA, where I was a member, if I could apply for it and he would sign the paperwork as the 'sponsor'. He thought that was a great idea. We got the call and I and some other guys used it a few times on drill weekends and it expired after I got out and now some guy in Western PA has it..."²

¹ From 1952 to 1969, K3AIR was licensed to the 1912th Air Command Communication Squadron, Olmsted AFB, Middletown, Pa.

² Licensed from 1970 to 1976. Currently licensed to Michael S. Lazaroff, Washington, PA, at least since 2017.

The Great NorthEast ShakeOut

Annual Multi-State Earthquake Drill

Volunteer Radio Groups

At 10:20 a.m. on October 20, 2022, thousands of people will “Drop, Cover, and Hold On” in The Great NorthEast ShakeOut, the region's largest earthquake drill ever! All volunteer radio groups are encouraged to participate in the drill (or plan a more extensive exercise).

Major earthquakes may happen anywhere you live, work, or travel. The ShakeOut is our chance to practice how to protect ourselves, and for everyone to become prepared. The goal is to prevent a major earthquake from becoming a catastrophe for you, your organization, and your community.

Why is a “Drop, Cover, and Hold On” drill important? To respond quickly you must practice often. You may only have seconds to protect yourself in an earthquake before strong shaking knocks you down, or something falls on you.



Millions of people worldwide have participated in Great ShakeOut Earthquake Drills since 2008. The Great NorthEast ShakeOut is held on the third Thursday of October each year.

Everyone can participate! Individuals, families, businesses, schools, colleges, government agencies and organizations are all invited to register.

HOW TO PARTICIPATE

Here are a few suggestions for what volunteer radio groups can do to participate in the ShakeOut. Learn more at ShakeOut.org/northeast/howtoparticipate.

Plan Your Drill:

- Register at ShakeOut.org/northeast/register to be counted as participating, get email updates, and more.
- Download a Drill Broadcast recording from ShakeOut.org/northeast/drill/broadcast.
- Have a “Drop, Cover, and Hold On” drill at 10:20 a.m. on October 20. You can also practice other aspects of your emergency plan.
- Discuss what you learned and make improvements.

Get Prepared for Earthquakes:

- Update MOUs with critical partners, community leaders and sponsors.
- Check your emergency equipment, such as fire extinguishers, first aid supplies and alternative power.
- Inspect your facilities for items that might fall and cause injury, and secure them with seismic restraints.
- Encourage all members to prepare at home.
- Provide CERT training.

Share the ShakeOut:

- Encourage everyone to ask their friends, families, neighbors and local businesses to register.
- Ask colleagues in other groups to participate.

RADIO HISTORY: The Three Callsigns of the Harrisburg Radio Amateurs Club

In August we had a brief history of the club name and origins going back to the 1920s. This month: a history of the three callsigns associated with the club.

W3IGU

1940: “W3IGU—Harrisburg Amateur Radio Club, C. C. Murlott Jr., 2008 Swatara St., Harrisburg, Pa.” is the earliest callsign associated with the club name.¹ World War II ceased U.S. radio operations, so no information is available from 1941 to 1945.

Post WWII, 1946, “W3IGU—Harrisburg Amateur Radio Club, W. N. Smith,² Club House, Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa.”³ (Despite the address, the Club’s meetings were at the Central YMCA, Harrisburg.⁴) It was short-lived—no call is found from 1948 thru 1953. The local newspapers show the club was active during this period, but does not cite a callsign. W3IGU was later picked up by William E. Denk, Devon, PA (1910-2006) in 2005, but expired.⁵ It is available for use.

W3ZEK

It wasn’t until the Fall of 1954 that “W3ZEK Harrisburg Radio Amateurs Club, 324 No. Second St., Harrisburg, Pa.” is noted.⁶ This address was at

“...the Heart Association of Hbg. The HRAC had the third floor which was a walk-up. A free Stress Test with each meeting! First time I went to the club, there was a Johnson

Viking II xmtr. and a Halli-crafters SX-100 rcvr. sitting on the table. Wow!”⁷

No explanation can be found as to why the change of callsign or who was the trustee.

The club call continued at that address until the summer of 1963, and it was not renewed and not found after that.⁸ But indeed, “W3ZEK was used during several Field Days! No one seemed to know that it had expired!”

The current FCC database shows no assignee.

W3UU

Hendry Shivers Byam, (1899-1990) Collingswood, NJ, first has the call W3UU in 1929.⁹ He apparently left amateur radio after one year and became a career early pioneer television engineer for CBS’s WCAU in Philadelphia.¹⁰

Edward Marlin Thompson (1906-1955) of Steelton, acquired W3UU from 1930¹¹ to mid-1941.¹² World War II came and radio activity ceased, but he reacquired the call in 1946, until his death in 1955. It wasn’t until the winter of 1968 that, “W3UU B Harrisburg RAC Inc, Wm Penn Memorial Mus, Harrisburg PA”^{13,14} reappeared used in an exhibit of a working amateur radio station at the State Museum.¹⁵ It used the Museum’s address until 1974, when it relocated to “230 State St, Harrisburg” — squarely in view of the Capitol building.¹⁶ Trustee unknown.

Richard Augustus Kerlin, K3AM (1923-2015), a well known friendly voice of local 2-meter FM simplex ragchewing seemingly became the trustee by 1981.¹⁷ Richard continued as the custodian until 1996,¹⁸ when **Steven V. Gobat, KA3PDQ**, became the steward having the longest trusteeship in club history with 25 years.

Trusteeship was conveyed to **David D. Dorman, Jr., KC3MG** in 2021 and continues today.¹⁹

THE RADIO AMATEUR CALL BOOK, Chicago: Radio Amateur Call Book, Inc.; located in Chicago, 1902-1968; in Lake Bluff, IL., 1969-1990; in New York, Watson-Guptill Publications, a division of BPI Communications, Inc., from 1991-1997.

It met with online competition in 1992, when Fred Lloyd, AA7BQ, took over from Carroll “Rusty” D. Carruth, Sr., N7IKQ (1926-2007). It quickly evolved into QRZ.com — now considered the de facto international look-up source with a claimed 21 million hits per month.²⁰

Since 1998, the call book does continue in CD-ROM or “USB stick” format by a German firm located at www.callbook.biz.
